## Class IX Chapter 13 - Surface Areas and Volumes Maths

Exercise 13.1 Question 1:

A plastic box 1.5 m long, 1.25 m wide and 65 cm deep, is to be made. It is to be open at the top. Ignoring the thickness of the plastic sheet, determine:
(i) The area of the sheet required for making the box.
(ii) The cost of sheet for it, if a sheet measuring $1 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ costs Rs 20 .

Answer:


It is given that, length ( I ) of box $=1.5 \mathrm{~m}$
Breadth (b) of box $=1.25 \mathrm{~m}$
Depth (h) of box $=0.65 \mathrm{~m}$
(i) Box is to be open at top.

Area of sheet required
$=2 \mathrm{lh}+2 \mathrm{bh}+\mathrm{lb}$
$=[2 \times 1.5 \times 0.65+2 \times 1.25 \times 0.65+1.5 \times 1.25] \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=(1.95+1.625+1.875) \mathrm{m}^{2}=5.45 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
(ii) Cost of sheet per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs 20

Cost of sheet of $5.45 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area $=\operatorname{Rs}(5.45 \times 20)=$ Rs 109

## Question 2:

The length, breadth and height of a room are $5 \mathrm{~m}, 4 \mathrm{~m}$ and 3 m respectively. Find the cost of white washing the walls of the room and the ceiling at the rate of Rs 7.50 per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$.

## Answer:

It is given that
Length (I) of room $=5 \mathrm{~m}$
Breadth (b) of room $=4 \mathrm{~m}$
Height (h) of room $=3 \mathrm{~m}$
It can be observed that four walls and the ceiling of the room are to be whitewashed.
The floor of the room is not to be white-washed.

Area to be white-washed = Area of walls + Area of ceiling of room
$=2 \mathrm{lh}+2 \mathrm{bh}+\mathrm{lb}$
$=[2 \times 5 \times 3+2 \times 4 \times 3+5 \times 4] \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=(30+24+20) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=74 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Cost of white-washing per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs 7.50

Cost of white-washing $74 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs $(74 \times 7.50)$
$=$ Rs 555
Question 3:
The floor of a rectangular hall has a perimeter 250 m . If the cost of panting the four walls at the rate of Rs. 10 per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$ is Rs.15000, find the height of the hall.
[Hint: Area of the four walls = Lateral surface area.] Answer:

Let length, breadth, and height of the rectangular hall be $1 \mathrm{~m}, \mathrm{~b} \mathrm{~m}$, and h m respectively.

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Area of four walls = 2lh + 2bh = 2(l
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+b) $h$
Perimeter of the floor of hall $=2(1+b)$
$=250 \mathrm{~m}$
Area of four walls $=2(I+b) h=250 h \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Cost of painting per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs 10
Cost of painting $250 \mathrm{~h} \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area $=\operatorname{Rs}(250 \mathrm{~h} \times 10)=$ Rs 2500 h

However, it is given that the cost of paining the walls is Rs 15000 .

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    15000 = 2500h h =
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6

Therefore, the height of the hall is 6 m . Question 4:
The paint in a certain container is sufficient to paint an area equal to $9.375 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$. How many bricks of dimensions $22.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 10 \mathrm{~cm} \times 7.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ can be painted out of this
container?

Answer:
Total surface area of one brick $=2(\mathrm{lb}+\mathrm{bh}+\mathrm{lh})$
$=[2(22.5 \times 10+10 \times 7.5+22.5 \times 7.5)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=2(225+75+168.75) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=(2 \times 468.75) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=937.5 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Let n bricks can be painted out by the paint of the container.
Area of $n$ bricks $=(\mathrm{n} \times 937.5) \mathrm{cm}^{2}=937.5 \mathrm{ncm}{ }^{2}$
Area that can be painted by the paint of the container $=9.375 \mathrm{~m}^{2}=93750 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
$\therefore 93750=937.5 \mathrm{n} \mathrm{n}=$
100
Therefore, 100 bricks can be painted out by the paint of the container.

## Question 5:

A cubical box has each edge 10 cm and another cuboidal box is 12.5 cm long, 10 cm wide and 8 cm high.
(i) Which box has the greater lateral surface area and by how much?
(ii) Which box has the smaller total surface area and by how much?

Answer:
(i) Edge of cube $=10 \mathrm{~cm}$

Length (I) of box $=12.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ Breadth
(b) of box $=10 \mathrm{~cm}$

Height (h) of box $=8 \mathrm{~cm}$
Lateral surface area of cubical box $=4(\text { edge })^{2}$
$=4(10 \mathrm{~cm})^{2}$
$=400 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Lateral surface area of cuboidal box $=2[\mathrm{lh}+\mathrm{bh}]=[2(12.5$
$\times 8+10 \times 8)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=(2 \times 180) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=360 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Clearly, the lateral surface area of the cubical box is greater than the lateral surface area of the cuboidal box.

Lateral surface area of cubical box - Lateral surface area of cuboidal box $=400 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ -
$360 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}=40 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$

Therefore, the lateral surface area of the cubical box is greater than the lateral surface area of the cuboidal box by $40 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$.
(ii) Total surface area of cubical box $=6(\text { edge })^{2}=6(10 \mathrm{~cm})^{2}=600 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$

Total surface area of cuboidal box $=2[\mathrm{lh}$
$+\mathrm{bh}+\mathrm{lb}$ ]
$=\left[2(12.5 \times 8+10 \times 8+12.5 \times 100] \mathrm{cm}^{2}\right.$
$=610 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Clearly, the total surface area of the cubical box is smaller than that of the cuboidal box.

Total surface area of cuboidal box - Total surface area of cubical box $=610 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}-600$ $\mathrm{cm}^{2}=10 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$

Therefore, the total surface area of the cubical box is smaller than that of the cuboidal box by $10 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$.

## Question 6:

A small indoor greenhouse (herbarium) is made entirely of glass panes (including base) held together with tape. It is 30 cm long, 25 cm wide and 25 cm high.
(i) What is the area of the glass?
(ii) How much of tape is needed for all the 12 edges?

Answer:
(i) Length (I) of green house $=30 \mathrm{~cm}$

Breadth (b) of green house $=25 \mathrm{~cm}$
Height $(\mathrm{h})$ of green house $=25 \mathrm{~cm}$
Total surface area of green house
$=2[\mathrm{lb}+\mathrm{lh}+\mathrm{bh}]$
$=[2(30 \times 25+30 \times 25+25 \times 25)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=[2(750+750+625)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=(2 \times 2125) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=4250 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Therefore, the area of glass is $4250 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$.
(ii)


It can be observed that tape is required along side $A B, B C, C D, D A, E F, F G, G H, H E$, $A H, B E, D G$, and CF.

Total length of tape $=4(I+b+h)$
$=[4(30+25+25)] \mathrm{cm}$
$=320 \mathrm{~cm}$
Therefore, 320 cm tape is required for all the 12 edges.
Question 7:
Shanti Sweets Stall was placing an order for making cardboard boxes for packing their sweets. Two sizes of boxes were required. The bigger of dimensions $25 \mathrm{~cm} \times 20 \mathrm{~cm} \times$ 5 cm and the smaller of dimensions $15 \mathrm{~cm} \times 12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 5 \mathrm{~cm}$. For all the overlaps, $5 \%$ of the total surface area is required extra. If the cost of the cardboard is Rs 4 for 1000 $\mathrm{cm}^{2}$, find the cost of cardboard required for supplying 250 boxes of each kind.

Answer:
Length ( $\mathrm{I}_{1}$ ) of bigger box $=25 \mathrm{~cm}$
Breadth ( $\mathrm{b}_{1}$ ) of bigger box $=20 \mathrm{~cm}$
Height ( $h_{1}$ ) of bigger box $=5 \mathrm{~cm}$
Total surface area of bigger box $=2(\mathrm{lb}+\mathrm{lh}+\mathrm{bh})=[2(25 \times$ $20+25 \times 5+20 \times 5)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=[2(500+125+100)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=1450 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Extra area required for overlapping $=\left(\frac{1450 \times 5}{100}\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=72.5 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
While considering all overlaps, total surface area of 1 bigger box
$=(1450+72.5) \mathrm{cm}^{2}=1522.5 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Area of cardboard sheet required for 250 such bigger boxes
$=(1522.5 \times 250) \mathrm{cm}^{2}=380625 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Similarly, total surface area of smaller box $=\left[2(15 \times 12+15 \times 5+12 \times 5] \mathrm{cm}^{2}\right.$
$=[2(180+75+60)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=(2 \times 315) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=630 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Therefore, extra area required for overlapping $=\left(\frac{630 \times 5}{100}\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2}=31.5 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Total surface area of 1 smaller box while considering all overlaps
$=(630+31.5) \mathrm{cm}^{2}=661.5 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Area of cardboard sheet required for 250 smaller boxes $=(250 \times 661.5) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=165375 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Total cardboard sheet required $=(380625+165375) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=546000 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Cost of $1000 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ cardboard sheet $=$ Rs 4

Cost of $546000 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ cardboard sheet $=\operatorname{Rs}\left(\frac{546000 \times 4}{1000}\right)=$ Rs 2184
Therefore, the cost of cardboard sheet required for 250 such boxes of each kind will be Rs 2184.

## Question 8:

Parveen wanted to make a temporary shelter for her car, by making a box-like structure with tarpaulin that covers all the four sides and the top of the car (with the front face as a flap which can be rolled up). Assuming that the stitching margins are very small, and therefore negligible, how much tarpaulin would be required to make the shelter of height 2.5 m , with base dimensions $4 \mathrm{~m} \times 3 \mathrm{~m}$ ?

Answer:
Length $(\mathrm{I})$ of shelter $=4 \mathrm{~m}$
Breadth (b) of shelter $=3 \mathrm{~m}$
Height (h) of shelter $=2.5 \mathrm{~m}$
Tarpaulin will be required for the top and four wall sides of the shelter.
Area of Tarpaulin required $=2(\mathrm{lh}+\mathrm{bh})+\mathrm{Ib}$
$=[2(4 \times 2.5+3 \times 2.5)+4 \times 3] \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=[2(10+7.5)+12] \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=47 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Therefore, $47 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ tarpaulin will be required.

The curved surface area of a right circular cylinder of height 14 cm is $88 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$. Find
the diameter of the base of the cylinder. Assume $\pi=\frac{22}{7}$ Answer:

Height (h) of cylinder $=14 \mathrm{~cm}$
Let the diameter of the cylinder be d.
Curved surface area of cylinder $=88 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
$\Rightarrow 2 \pi r h=88 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ ( $r$ is the radius of the base of the cylinder) $\Rightarrow \pi \mathrm{dh}=$
$88 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}(\mathrm{~d}=2 \mathrm{r})$

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \frac{22}{7} \times d \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}=88 \mathrm{~cm}^{2} \\
& \Rightarrow \\
& \Rightarrow \mathrm{~d}=2 \mathrm{~cm}
\end{aligned}
$$

Therefore, the diameter of the base of the cylinder is 2 cm .

## Question 2:

It is required to make a closed cylindrical tank of height 1 m and base diameter 140 cm from a metal sheet. How many square meters of the sheet are required for the
same? $\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$
Answer:
Height (h) of cylindrical tank $=1 \mathrm{~m}$

Base radius (r) of cylindrical tank $=\left(\frac{140}{2}\right) \mathrm{cm}=70 \mathrm{~cm}=0.7 \mathrm{~m}$

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\begin{aligned}
\text { Area of sheet required } & =\text { Total surface area of tank }=2 \pi r(r+h) \\
& =\left[2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 0.7(0.7+1)\right] \mathrm{m}^{2} \\
& =(4.4 \times 1.7) \mathrm{m}^{2} \\
& =7.48 \mathrm{~m}^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

Therefore, it will require $7.48 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area of sheet.

## Question 3:

A metal pipe is 77 cm long. The inner diameter of a cross section is 4 cm , the outer diameter being 4.4 cm .

(i) Inner curved surface area,
(ii) Outer curved surface area,
(iii) Total surface area, $\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$
(iii) Total surface area.

Answer:

Inner radius of cylindrical pipe

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=\left(\frac{4}{2}\right) \mathrm{cm}=2 \mathrm{~cm}
$$

Outer radius ${ }_{\left(r_{2}\right)}^{\text {of cylindrical pipe }} \left\lvert\,=\left(\frac{4.4}{2}\right) \mathrm{cm}=2.2 \mathrm{~cm}\right.$
Height (h) of cylindrical pipe $=$ Length of cylindrical pipe $=77 \mathrm{~cm}$
(i) CSA of inner surface of pipe $=2 \pi r_{i} h$
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 2 \times 77\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=968 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
(ii) CSA of outer surface of pipe $=2 \pi r_{2} h$
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 2.2 \times 77\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=(22 \times 22 \times 2.2) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=1064.8 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
(iii) Total surface area of pipe $=$ CSA of inner surface + CSA of outer surface + Area of both circular ends of pipe

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\begin{aligned}
& =2 \pi r_{1} h+2 \pi r_{2} h+2 \pi\left(r_{2}^{2}-r_{1}^{2}\right) \\
& =\left[968+1064.8+2 \pi\left\{(2.2)^{2}-(2)^{2}\right\}\right] \mathrm{cm}^{2} \\
& =\left(2032.8+2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 0.84\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2} \\
& =(2032.8+5.28) \mathrm{cm}^{2} \\
& =2038.08 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

Therefore, the total surface area of the cylindrical pipe is $2038.08 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$.

## Question 4:

The diameter of a roller is 84 cm and its length is 120 cm . It takes 500 complete revolutions to move once over to level a playground. Find the area of the playground
in $\mathrm{m}^{2}$ ? $\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$
Answer:
It can be observed that a roller is cylindrical.
Height (h) of cylindrical roller = Length of roller $=120 \mathrm{~cm}$
Radius ( $r$ ) of the circular end of roller $=\left(\frac{84}{2}\right) \mathrm{cm}=42 \mathrm{~cm}$
CSA of roller $=2 n r h$
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 42 \times 120\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=31680 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Area of field $=500 \times$ CSA of roller
$=(500 \times 31680) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=15840000 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
$=1584 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$

## Question 5:

A cylindrical pillar is 50 cm in diameter and 3.5 m in height. Find the cost of painting
the curved surface of the pillar at the rate of Rs. 12.50 per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$.

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\left[\text { Assume } \pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]
$$

Answer:
Height (h) cylindrical pillar $=3.5 \mathrm{~m}$
Radius $(r)$ of the circular end of pillar $=\frac{50}{2}=25 \mathrm{~cm}$
$=0.25 \mathrm{~m}$

CSA of pillar $=2$ nrh
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 0.25 \times 3.5\right) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=(44 \times 0.125) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=5.5 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Cost of painting $1 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs 12.50 Cost of painting $5.5 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
area $=\operatorname{Rs}(5.5 \times 12.50)$
$=$ Rs 68.75

Therefore, the cost of painting the CSA of the pillar is Rs 68.75.

## Question 6:

Curved surface area of a right circular cylinder is $4.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$. If the radius of the base of
the cylinder is 0.7 m , find its height.
$\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$
Answer:

Let the height of the circular cylinder be $h$.
Radius ( $r$ ) of the base of cylinder $=0.7 \mathrm{~m}$

CSA of cylinder $=4.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
$2 \pi r h=4.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
$\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 0.7 \times h\right) \mathrm{m}=4.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
$\mathrm{h}=1 \mathrm{~m}$
Therefore, the height of the cylinder is 1 m .

## Question 7:

The inner diameter of a circular well is 3.5 m . It is 10 m deep. Find ( i )
Its inner curved surface area,
(ii) The cost of plastering this curved surface at the rate of Rs 40 per $\mathrm{m}^{2}$.
$\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$
Answer:
Inner radius ( $r$ ) of circular well $=\left(\frac{3.5}{2}\right) \mathrm{m}=1.75 \mathrm{~m}$
Depth (h) of circular well $=10 \mathrm{~m}$
Inner curved surface area $=2 \pi r h$
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 1.75 \times 10\right) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=(44 \times 0.25 \times 10) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=110 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Therefore, the inner curved surface area of the circular well is $110 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$.
Cost of plastering $1 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs 40
Cost of plastering $100 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs $(110 \times 40)$
$=$ Rs 4400
Therefore, the cost of plastering the CSA of this well is Rs 4400. Question 8:

In a hot water heating system, there is a cylindrical pipe of length 28 m and
diameter 5 cm . Find the total radiating surface in the system.

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\left[\text { Assume } \pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]
$$

Answer:
Height (h) of cylindrical pipe $=$ Length of cylindrical pipe $=28 \mathrm{~m}$
Radius ( $r$ ) of circular end of pipe $=\frac{5}{2}=2.5 \mathrm{~cm}=0.025 \mathrm{~m}$
CSA of cylindrical pipe $=2$ rrh
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 0.025 \times 28\right) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=4.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
The area of the radiating surface of the system is $4.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$.
Question 9:
Find
(i) The lateral or curved surface area of a closed cylindrical petrol storage tank that is
4.2 m in diameter and 4.5 m high.
(ii) How much steel was actually used, if $\sqrt{\frac{1}{12}}$ of the steel actually used was wasted in making the tank. $\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$

Answer:
Height (h) of cylindrical tank $=4.5 \mathrm{~m}$

Radius $(r)$ of the circular end of cylindrical tank $=\left(\frac{4.2}{2}\right) \mathrm{m}=2.1 \mathrm{~m}$
(i) Lateral or curved surface area of tank $=2$ rrh
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 2.1 \times 4.5\right) \mathrm{m}^{2}=(44$
$\times 0.3 \times 4.5) \mathrm{m}^{2}=59.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Therefore, CSA of tank is $59.4 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$.
(ii) Total surface area of tank $=2 \pi r(r+h)$
$=\left[2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 2.1 \times(2.1+4.5)\right] \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=(44 \times 0.3 \times 6.6) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$=87.12 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Let $\mathrm{A} \mathrm{m}^{2}$ steel sheet be actually used in making the tank.
$\therefore \mathrm{A}\left(1-\frac{1}{12}\right)=87.12 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
$\Rightarrow \mathrm{A}=\left(\frac{12}{11} \times 87.12\right) \mathrm{m}^{2}$
$\Rightarrow \mathrm{A}=95.04 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$
Therefore, $95.04 \mathrm{~m}^{2}$ steel was used in actual while making such a tank.

## Question 10:

In the given figure, you see the frame of a lampshade. It is to be covered with a decorative cloth. The frame has a base diameter of 20 cm and height of 30 cm . A margin of 2.5 cm is to be given for folding it over the top and bottom of the frame.

Find how much cloth is required for covering the lampshade.

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\left[\text { Assume } \pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]
$$



Answer:


Height $(h)$ of the frame of lampshade $=(2.5+30+2.5) \mathrm{cm}=35 \mathrm{~cm}$
Radius $(r)$ of the circular end of the frame of lampshade $=\left(\frac{20}{2}\right) \mathrm{cm}=10 \mathrm{~cm}$
Cloth required for covering the lampshade $=2$ rrh
$=\left(2 \times \frac{22}{7} \times 10 \times 35\right) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=2200 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Hence, for covering the lampshade, $2200 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ cloth will be required.
Question 11:

The students of a Vidyalaya were asked to participate in a competition for making and decorating penholders in the shape of a cylinder with a base, using cardboard. Each penholder was to be of radius 3 cm and height 10.5 cm . The Vidyalaya was to supply the competitors with cardboard. If there were 35 competitors, how much
cardboard was required to be bought for the competition? $\left[\right.$ Assume $\left.\pi=\frac{22}{7}\right]$
Answer:
Radius ( $r$ ) of the circular end of cylindrical penholder $=3 \mathrm{~cm}$
Height (h) of penholder $=10.5 \mathrm{~cm}$
Surface area of 1 penholder = CSA of penholder + Area of base of penholder $=2 \pi r h+\pi r^{2}$

Area of cardboard sheet used by 1 competitor

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\begin{aligned}

of the bookshelf.

External breadth (b) of book self $=25 \mathrm{~cm}$
External height (h) of book self $=110 \mathrm{~cm}$
External surface area of shelf while leaving out the front face of the shelf
$=1 \mathrm{~h}+2(\mathrm{lb}+\mathrm{bh})$
$=[85 \times 110+2(85 \times 25+25 \times 110)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=(9350+9750) \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=19100 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Area of front face $=[85 \times 110-75 \times 100+2(75 \times 5)] \mathrm{cm}^{2}$
$=1850+750 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
$=2600 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Area to be polished $=(19100+2600) \mathrm{cm}^{2}=21700 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$
Cost of polishing $1 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ area $=$ Rs 0.20
Cost of polishing $21700 \mathrm{~cm}^{2}$ area Rs $(21700 \times 0.20)=$ Rs 4340
